Big Brush Club

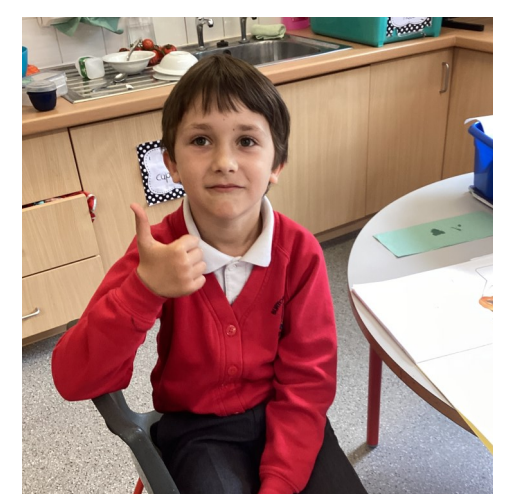
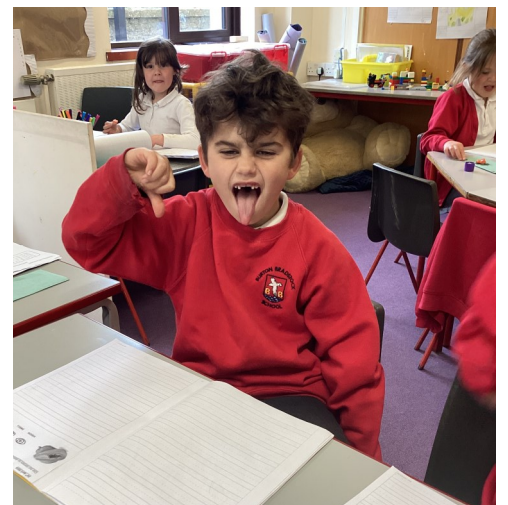

Write a letter
Dear Mum,
